In “[Sisters Act](#)” ([July/August 2011](#)), three African-American New Jersey women—Dottie Rains, Michelle Braxton and Minister Jae Quinlan—shared their inspiring stories and discussed the misconception that HIV is exclusively a “man’s disease.” Their home state has the highest proportion of people living with HIV/AIDS who are women, mostly women of color.

I was so thrilled to see my friend Dottie Rains on the cover of *POZ*. I have known her for many years—what a wonderful person and role model. New Jersey’s problems with HIV are distinctive: We are fifth nationwide in the number of people infected with HIV, but first in the number of women infected with HIV. Your bringing our unique view of the virus to light will make it easier for those of us going into the community to do education and prevention work.
