1 -The World Health Organization (WHO) launches World AIDS Day. (1988)

The New York City AIDS Memorial, a tribute to the over 100,000 New Yorkers who have died of AIDS-related illness, is unveiled at a public dedication on World AIDS Day. (2016)

2 - AIDS activist Katrina Haslip dies of AIDS-related causes at age 33. Haslip's advocacy helped force the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to expand the definition of HIV/AIDS to include more illnesses that affect women. (1992)
