



Harry Potter and the Secret HIV Metaphor

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As all Harry Potter fans know, Hogwarts professor Remus Lupin lived with lycanthropy, a chronic condition that turned him into a werewolf. But we recently learned that author J.K. Rowling meant this as a “metaphor for those illnesses that carry a stigma, like HIV and AIDS.” Writing on [Pottermore.com](#), Rowling explained that “all kinds of superstitions seem to surround blood-borne conditions, probably due to taboos surrounding blood itself.
