The latest Reunion Project conference is taking place in South Florida.

Long-term survivors of HIV/AIDS are gathering this weekend in Fort Lauderdale, Florida, for the Thrive Weekend Summit and The Reunion Project South Florida Conference. The event offers workshops, panel discussions, lectures, networking opportunities and chances to share stories and strategies for thriving with the virus.

Special sections on Saturday include “HIV and Aging—Mindfulness for Thriving” by Brad Ogilve; “Long-Term Effects of Medication,” by Elie Schochet, MD; “Effectively Dealing With Isolation” by Nancy MacColl, LCSW; and “Resilience and Thriving” by David Fawcett, PhD, LCSW.

Attendees will also have a chance to tour the World AIDS Museum and participate in a community forum on long-term survivors.
