POZ asked for your thoughts about how HIV/AIDS is portrayed in pop culture and by mainstream media. Here are your responses:

How important do you think it is to have people living with HIV/AIDS portrayed in pop culture?

- 81% Very important
- 16% Somewhat important
- 13% Not important

Do you feel that your concerns about HIV/AIDS are adequately portrayed in pop culture?

- 15% No
- 85% Yes

- 53% of you saw Dallas Buyers Club
- 37% of you saw The Normal Heart
- 31% of you saw How to Survive a Plague
- 19% of you saw United in Anger: A History of ACT UP

How accurately do you think mainstream media covers the stories of people living with HIV/AIDS?

- 6% Very accurately
- 52% Somewhat accurately
- 42% Not accurately

In general, how would you rate mainstream media's recent coverage of HIV/AIDS?

- 18% Mostly positive
- 39% Mostly negative
- 43% Equally positive and negative

How important is it to have celebrities involved in HIV/AIDS awareness efforts?

- 81% Very important
- 15% Somewhat important
- 4% Not important
