My name is Shelby Ann Welchel and I have been HIV positive since 1982. When I was 15 years old, a man shot and killed my 18-month-old son and then proceeded to shoot me in the head and in the back. He then turned the gun on himself. When I woke up from a coma in the hospital in February 1985, I was told that I had HIV. That was when my life started.

I was in recovery for a year and when I came out, I finished school and got my associate's degree and my master's degree. I was also working at an AIDS organization in the state of Arizona. I worked for 24-plus years in different foundations and organizations and networks in the HIV/AIDS world. I worked with men, women and children, but working with the kids was my biggest love.

There is not a day that I regret working in HIV/AIDS field. The people I've worked with have been a family to me and they have been my support system throughout the last 30 years. They will continue to be my support system and I will continue to be their support system. I will continue to help anybody and everybody that I can, until the day I die from this disease. I hope that won't be for another 30 years.

I am the co-founder of the [Rise Above HIV](#) campaign, which is a worldwide anti-stigma campaign for people who are affected or infected by HIV/AIDS. In 2014, we created the I Want a Cure campaign because 33 years of HIV/AIDS is long enough. It's time for a cure.

I have had AIDS for five years. My CD4 count is 22 and my viral load is in the hundreds of thousands. I have fought and beat cervical cancer and lung cancer. For the last six months, I have been dealing with dementia.

But I am blessed and God is good.
