



USCHA Day One: Scenes From the 2025 U.S. Conference on HIV/AIDS

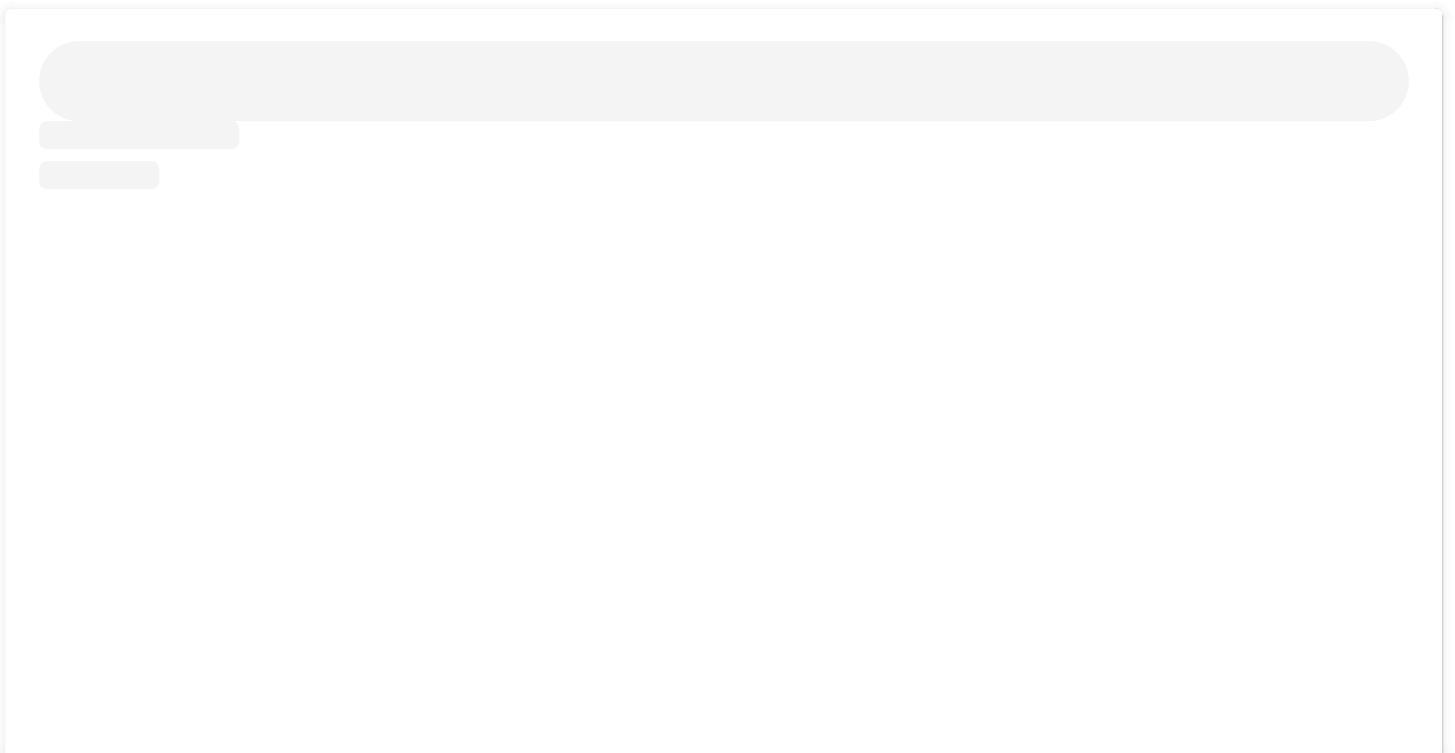
Protests on Capitol Hill, DEI whiplash, long-term survivors, dandelions and a Choose U debut: Check them out at this year's USCHA in Washington, DC.

The [U.S. Conference on HIV/AIDS \(USCHA\)](#) takes place annually in rotating cities across the nation, but the 2025 return to Washington, DC, seems to capture this specific moment in history. Congress members, freshly returned from summer break, are about to vote on a proposed budget that guts [HIV funding](#) and erases decades of progress. [Health Secretary Robert F. Kennedy Jr.](#), who has been dismantling federal health institutions and lifesaving policies, is being grilled by lawmakers. HIV organizations are scrambling to survive in a brave new world in which federal grants will definitely not go to populations that need support the most. And oh, yes, National Guard troops and militarized ICE (U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement) agents roam the streets to intimidate and terrorize citizens at the whim of President Trump.

At least the weather is gorgeous.

Advocates, allies, elected officials, health care providers, pharma reps, researchers and, of course, all manner of folks living with the virus—everyone has come together in a display of resilience and strength, to educate, uplift, protest and, yes, to have a joyous good time.

The conference runs Thursday to Sunday, and this year's theme is "Aging With HIV." Thursday's luncheon plenary was titled "Beyond Belief." Presented by [drugmaker ViiV Healthcare](#), it featured five memorable speakers who shared their unique journeys aging with the virus: Grissel Granados (she was born with HIV—[a group referred to as dandelions](#)—and is now a mom about to turn 40), Louis Ortiz-Fonseca, Jeff Berry, Keith Green and [Rae Lewis-Thornton](#) (she tested positive in 1987 when she was 24; folks like her are referred to as [long-term survivors](#)).

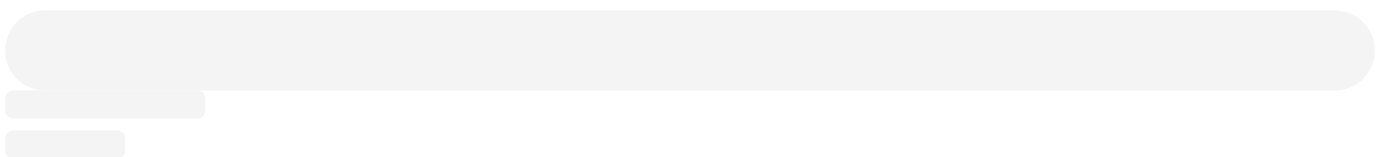

Also on the plenary conference stage was [Harold Phillips, making his debut as the incoming CEO of NMAC](#) (formerly the National Minority AIDS Council), the organization that spearheads USCHA. For the occasion, Phillips rocked an “I [Heart] CDC” T-shirt, one of the many nods throughout the conference to federal workers at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the National Institutes of Health who have been fired or degraded by Trump despite their dedication to public health.

In the upside-down world that is 2025, many federal workers—even those employed in HIV-serving programs—were forbidden from attending USCHA. That’s because the Trump administration refuses funding and support of programs that promote diversity, equity and inclusion (DEI). Considering that HIV disproportionately affects Black, brown and LGBTQ communities and that effective HIV programs center the needs of these people, well, you can see the dire need for this conference at this moment.





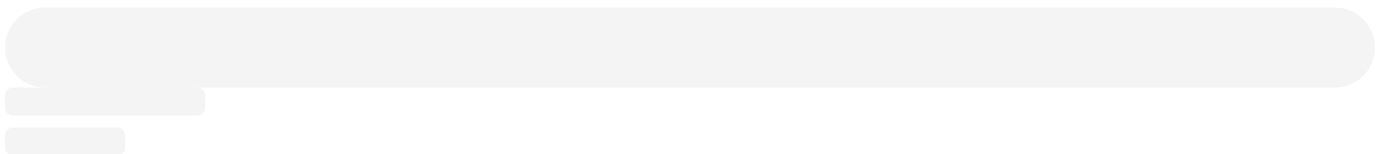

Every morning and afternoon of USCHA, conference-goers can attend any number of break-out sessions. In fact, one Thursday morning session focused on “DEI Whiplash” and ways to secure financial stability for your organization as federal funding dries up. (Hint: Tweak your grant proposals to ensure they include favorable buzzwords.) Other sessions covered “HIV and the Law,” “Exploring Reproductive Aging in Women Living with HIV,” “HIV and Medicare: What You Need to Know,” “Forever Undetectable: Harnessing U=U for Older Adults” and many other topics.

U=U stands for [Undetectable Equals Untransmittable](#), meaning that people with an undetectable viral load don’t transmit HIV to others through sex. What’s more, people with HIV who achieve and maintain viral suppression experience slower disease progression, are less likely to develop opportunistic illnesses and are able to enjoy better overall health.

The kickoff of USCHA also coincided with the [launch of the “Choose U” initiative by HIV pharma giant Gilead Sciences](#). Complementing USCHA’s Aging with HIV theme, this initiative spotlights people living a long life with HIV treatment and encourages them to prioritize self-care and wellness, especially considering that treatment is a lifelong commitment.

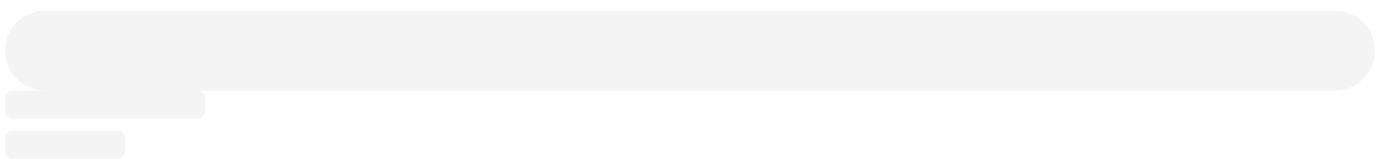
“Treatment is bigger than just, I’m going to the doctor. It’s a lifestyle. It’s having a holistic view,” says Kim, who identifies as a dandelion, in one of the campaign videos. “An HIV diagnosis does not define who someone is or their future self.
