2021 was very difficult for me. I lost too many close friends and had real challenges figuring out how to manage the insanity of COVID with their deaths. I just found out that Christmas is next week!! How can that be possible? I am not ready.

Topping my to-do list are thank yous to everyone who helped NMAC get through another crazy year. The relentless onslaught of COVID alongside too many important social challenges made 2021 another for the record books. The roller coaster of variants along with the isolation to protect my health left me befuddled and discombobulated. It also made me very grateful for the help and support received during these unprecedented times.

No matter how strong or independent I thought I was, COVID said "hah." Yet even with the insanity of one virus, we were able to make progress fighting another. The event at the White House on World AIDS Day got the most powerful leader in the free world to commit his administration to ending the HIV epidemic by 2030 and to end it in a syndemic fashion while understanding that racism is a public health challenge. The event, speech, proclamation, and plan were the culmination of decades of struggle by many who could not be in the room. On these days I am reminded of leaders who were taken too soon. What would Richard Dunne, my mentor, the second executive director of GMHC who passed too soon, think about our plans to end the epidemic.
