

What Does it Take to Achieve a Community-free AIDS Conference?

My colleague, TAG's Michael Palm Basic Science, Vaccines, and Prevention Project Coordinator Richard Jefferys, asks in a [recent blog post](#): "What Does it Take to Achieve a Community-free AIDS Conference?"

A conference being held in San Francisco from November 3-5, named "What Will it Take to Achieve an AIDS-free World?" and sponsored by the scientific journals The Lancet and Cell, is ignominiously answering the question posed in the title of this post: don't provide an option to register until less than a month before the event and charge a \$400 registration fee (the public registration option at this "special rate" was only added to the conference website in the last couple of days). TAG's plea to the organizers--made in March of this year--requesting that they at least allow an option for local community members to attend without paying a steep fee has seemingly fallen on deaf ears. It is lamentable that an event attempting to look toward a

brighter future should harken back to the dark days when people with HIV and community-based activists were excluded from attending scientific meetings.

TAG encourages HIV activists to reach out to the conference organizers to offer a feasible alternative to paying \$400, at least for local community members seeking to participate in the critical dialog that is expected to take place.
